LSD is making a sweep across the district. An email was recently sent out warning parents about LSD after a student in Montgomery died due to overdosing on LSD.

“We (the staff) were sent an email and I read the Newspaper, hopefully the family’s do and that they tell their students about it,” Counselor Mrs. Schuck said.

LSD, which stands for Lysergic Acid Diethylamide, also known simply as acid is put on tabs or “stamps” which are placed on the tongue or skin to be ingested. The effect of LSD can last up to 12 hours.

“I know LSD causes Hallucinations and weird thoughts or feelings, but I didn’t know a kid died from LSD,” sophomore Isaha Morales said.

LSD has two main side effects; it can cause

pleasurable sensation or terrifying nightmares.

“I know a lot of people who have taken LSD, but I don’t see a lot of kids here that have LSD or have taken it,” sophomore Morales said.

It is important for students to know how drugs can harm students cause serious reactions to them due to ingesting the substance, and potentially kill them.

“Students should know that they are good students by not doing drugs. I mean that could have been that students first time and they ended up dying,” Mrs. Schuck said.
